

Magic pepper

Effect:

Magician has a cup with pepper and water. Volunteer puts fingers in water trying to separate the pepper. This will not work. Magician puts fingers in water and the water separates.

Supplies:

Water, soap, pepper, cup.

Secret:

Rub soap on your fingers. This will separate pepper!

Advice:

Be careful with the pepper and avoid touching your eyes.

Magic sugar cube

Effect:

The magician asks for a volunteer from the audience. The volunteer picks a number between 1 and 10. The magician writes the number on a sugar cube. The magician drops the cube into a cup of water and holds the volunteer's hand over the water. He/she turns the volunteer's hand over and Poof! the number is on the volunteer's hand.

Supplies:

A pencil (must be a pencil, pen will NOT work)
A sugar cube (you can have several for effect)
A glass of water

Secret:

Have the volunteer pick a number. Write it onto the sugar cube with a pencil (press hard). Then, hold the cube between your thumb and one finger. Hold it so the number transfers onto your thumb and say, "Now I will put this cube into the cup". Press the cube as hard as possible so the number is on your thumb. Put the cube into the water and hold the volunteer's hand above the water, make sure your thumb is in their palm so the number from your finger transfers onto the volunteer's hand.

LOUIS BRAILLE

(January 4, 1809 – January 6, 1852)

Millions of blind people are able to read and write as clearly as people with clear vision. This was not always the case and once it was thought that it would never be the case.

So who created the preferred mode of communication for the blind? You may be surprised to find out that it wasn't a scientist or researcher who developed these methods. Rather, the vehicle for reading was invented in 1824 by a 15-year-old named Louis Braille.

Louis was three when he became blind in one eye and soon lost the vision in the other. Despite his loss of sight, Louis knew he wanted to maintain communication with the world. So he set out to develop a fail-proof system: a system of six dots that allowed for easy recognition of letters with a simple touch of a fingertip and made writing much easier for blind people. Two years later, at seventeen, Louis adapted his method to music notation. Blind individuals who might never have become musicians or composers now had an opportunity. Later, he added a system that would make reading and writing mathematical notations easier for the blind. All of his hard work and determination allowed the Braille language to change the worlds of music, science, mathematics and literature. Older individuals had tried various methods that were more complicated and less productive than that of the teenager who changed life for millions of people, those both with and without full visual capabilities. Today, the six-dot Braille system is used in virtually every language and location in the world. Amazing?

EASY STEPS
FOR A GREAT
LETTER
to Santa

Have you been a good kid this year? Well, now it's time to answer and ask for a Christmas present.

1. Get in the Christmas mood.

Put on some Christmas music or your favorite holiday shirt so you'll be ready to think about Santa.

2. Ask your parents for some paper and a pen or pencil.

3. Start your letter with a greeting, also known as a salutation. Good ways to start your letter include "Dear Santa" or "Dear Santa Claus."

4. Let Santa know who's writing the letter.

Of course he knows who you are! But you need to let him know that it's you that is writing the letter because he gets so many letters every day.

5. Ask Santa how he's been.

Santa only hears from you once a year, so before you start asking about toys, it's polite to ask how he's doing or how the reindeer and elves and Mrs. Claus have been.

6. Tell him how good you've been this year.

Before you ask for toys, you'll also want to remind Santa Claus of some of the good things you've done this year. Have you been nice to your sister or brother? Have you helped your parents by putting all your toys away? Santa already knows these things because he sees you when you're sleeping and knows when you're awake, but he likes to be reminded of the reasons you should be on Santa's Nice List.

7. Politely let him know what toys you'd like.

Ok, you've asked about his life and told him how good you've been, so NOW you can let him know what toys you'd like. Try to keep your list to the two or three things that you want the very, very most. That way he'll know which gifts to bring.

8. Thank Santa for being so kind and close your letter with your signature.

After asking Santa for a few toys, be sure to thank him for his kindness by saying something such as, "Thank you, Santa, for bringing so much joy to kids like me" or "Thanks, Santa, for bringing me toys every year." Santa loves little kids who are polite. Then end your letter with a closing such as "Sincerely" or "Love" or "Best wishes" and sign your name.

CHRISTMAS TREE COOKIES!

No matter how many more chimneys await his arrival, Santa Claus won't be able to resist these tempting cookies on New Year's Eve! With a little help from your parents, success is undeniable.

How to do it:

Melt butter on a pan. Add the marshmallows and stir for 2-4 minutes. Once marshmallows are melted, add the green artificial food coloring. Stir continuously and add the vanilla and almond extract while stirring. Add sugar and stir until it blends with the other ingredients. Remove from heat, add the cornflakes, mix it well until blending perfectly with the rest of the ingredients. Drop mixtures on the Christmas tree molds and top it with red sprinkles. Let it cool for 5 minutes and place it in the refrigerator to harden.



REINDEER

It's fun to learn interesting reindeer facts at holiday time, when we're all thinking about Santa and his magical sleigh-pulling team.

But what do you know about reindeer?

Here are some fun facts to share with your friends and family.

- Reindeer are found in the arctic and subarctic regions of North America, Europe and Asia. Reindeer have thick, multi-layered fur that is specially suited for the harsh arctic climate where they live.
- Male reindeer can sometimes weigh as much as 700 pounds. Females are smaller, weighing only about 350 pounds.
- Male reindeer are called bulls and females are called cows. Baby reindeer are called calves.
- Reindeer typically have a lifespan of around 10 years.
- Reindeer are the only deer species in which both the male and females grow antlers, although the males' antlers are bigger.
- Reindeer shed and regrow their antlers every year. Males usually shed their antlers by early December, while females usually don't shed their antlers until after they give birth, in the spring.
- Reindeer usually mate in the fall, and their young are born the following spring. A reindeer will usually give birth to one or two calves at a time.
- Reindeer calves can begin grazing by the time they are 45 days old, although they will continue drinking mother's milk until the autumn after their birth.
- Reindeer have an excellent sense of smell. Because food is scarce in the Arctic, reindeer use their great sense of smell to detect food buried deep beneath the snow.
- Reindeer are excellent swimmers.

BACK IN TIME



Monopoly game is **the most famous and most successful board game** worldwide! Let's turn the clocks back and learn some interesting things about it.

Monopoly is a board game published by Parker Brothers, a subsidiary of Hasbro. The game is named after the economic concept of monopoly, the domination of a market by a single entity. Monopoly is a redesign of an earlier game "The Landlord's Game", first published by the Quaker and political activist Elizabeth Magie. The purpose of that game was to teach people how monopolies end up bankrupting the many and giving extraordinary wealth to one or few individuals. Since the game was created, more than one billion people have played it, making it "the most played (commercial) board game in the world." The 1999 Guinness Book of Records cited Hasbro's previous statistic of 500 million people having played Monopoly. Games Magazine has inducted Monopoly into its Hall of Fame. The mascot for the game, known as Mr. Monopoly or Rich Uncle Pennybags, is an elderly moustached man in morning dress with a walking cane and top hat.


The history of Monopoly can be traced back to 1903, when a Quaker woman named Elizabeth (Lizzie) J. Magie Phillips created a game through which she hoped to be able to explain the single tax theory of Henry George (it was intended to illustrate the negative aspects of concentrating land in private monopolies). Her game, The Landlord's Game, was commercially published in 1924. Other interested game players redeveloped the game, some changing its name to Auction Monopoly and later to plain Monopoly, and many making their own sets customized for their own cities. Several people, mostly in the

U.S. Midwest and near the U.S. East Coast, contributed to the American version of the game's design and evolution. Phillips herself patented a revised edition of the game in 1923, and similar games of this nature were published commercially. Charles Darrow is known to have played an Atlantic City variation of "Monopoly", created by his friends, the Todds, who lived in Philadelphia. He became unemployed in the 1929 crash and decided to sell copies of the game taught to him by the Todds. He launched it in 1933 and it quickly made him rich. In 1935 Parker Brothers bought the rights from Darrow and started manufacturing a slightly updated version. In the same year Waddingtons bought the UK rights to the game and made a version based on the streets of London.

In 1941 the British Secret Service had John Waddington Ltd., the licensed manufacturer of the game outside the U.S., create a special edition for World War II prisoners of war held by the Nazis. Hidden inside these games were maps, compasses, real money, and other objects useful for escaping. They were distributed to prisoners by secret service-created fake charity groups. This was the first "special issue" of the game.

By the 1970s, the game's early history had been lost (at least one historian has argued that it was purposely suppressed), and the idea that it had been created solely by Charles Darrow had become popular folklore. This was stated in the 1974 book *The Monopoly Book: Strategy and Tactics of the World's Most Popular Game*, by Maxine Brady, and

even in the instructions of the game itself. As Professor Ralph Anspach fought Parker Brothers and its then parent company, General Mills, over the trademarks of the Monopoly board game, much of the early history of the game was "rediscovered". Because of the lengthy court process, and appeals, the legal status of Parker Brothers' trademarks on the game was not settled until the late 1970s. Anspach won the case on appeals in 1979, as the 9th District Court determined that the trademark "Monopoly" was generic, and therefore unenforceable. However, on Hasbro's pressure, the US Congress immediately passed a statute amending the Trademark Act to protect longstanding marks against 'generic' claims. Thus the game's name remains a registered trademark of Parker Brothers, as do its specific design elements. Parker Brothers' current corporate parent, Hasbro, now acknowledges that Charles Darrow was responsible for the development of the modern Monopoly, but did not invent the original game. Anspach published a book about his research, called *The Billion Dollar Monopoly Swindle* (and republished as *Monopolygate*), in which he makes his case about the purposeful suppression of the game's early history and development.
